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Reviews of the Premiere of CBS's *Elementary* – A New Modern Sherlock Holmes TV Series

A Review of *Elementary*

I liked the pilot and will watch to see the series develop. I enjoyed the intellectual interplay between Holmes and Watson as equals with no sexual innuendo. The plot seemed a little contrived but the clues were presented fairly it you were that fast. Everyone in this, the BCC and the movies talk so fast. The rewind feature is a great gift is to me. I liked that Watson supplied valid information that helped solve the case. Holmes was extremely fragile and on the edge. Watson brought him back into the real world. A good original effort to bring Holmes into the 21st century.

Since I wrote the above review I was able to attend the Dinner and *Elementary* review on September 13th. We had interesting discussions. One of the points brought up was the fact that Holmes had tattoos. A Lady felt that Holmes would not abuse his body in that way. A Gentleman brought up the points that Holmes seemed to use a prostitute and Holmes statement that his body had needs and he had to feed the sexual one, too. The Gentleman stated that Holmes would not do that.

I expressed the opinions that the producers' purpose was to create a new Holmes different from the BBC series, the current movie creations and the Canon's model. *Elementary* is still trying to work out the finer points of this Holmes. We will have to watch and see. In the meantime I feel that the show keeps Holmes before the public and maybe bring more members to us cannot be a bad thing.

I saw the pilot of *Elementary* as well. There are some aspects Sherlockians may have trouble with. As many Holmes scholars imagine, this Holmes also has his heart broken by a woman, but rather recently instead of in his youth. Still, he has sex with prostitutes, so that he can "operate at peak efficiency." Also, he does not charge for his services to the police, so he doesn't have to "answer to anybody."

He's totally dependent on his wealthy father for room and board, which seems out of character with the Canonical Holmes. I predict longtime Holmes readers won't like these aspects. He is socially awkward and emotionally fragile, like Cumberbatch version, and, to a lesser extent, the Brett version, which is working for me so far. Here's what also worked for me. I liked the I also liked his relationship with beekeeping. Watson as it is developing. I liked the dynamic between the Holmes and Watson characters, clearly a strong friendship is what they have in mind for the two of them. Good friendship chemistry between the two actors. Watson was smart but laid-back, with her own problems, but a certain obsession with Holmes's work. They clearly need each other. Holmes portrayed as the high strung genius for sure. The mystery was clear, almost simple, with fair clues that can be observed by the viewer, so you at least have a chance to solve it. Not a terrible puzzle, in the Holmes style. I'm sure I'll continue to watch, though it is definitely not of the BBC SHERLOCK series caliber. It is cuter and light fun, not to be taken too seriously, IMHO.

Elementary -- Nothing Remarkable

Elementary is a modern day interpretation of Sherlock Holmes set in New York City. Jonny Lee Miller (who shared the roles of Dr. Frankenstein with BBC's *Sherlock*, Benedict Cumberbatch) is Sherlock Holmes and Lucy Liu is Joan Watson.

My first reaction to the *Elementary* premiere was that it was not particularly remarkable. It lacked the "Oh, wow!" moments of BBC's *Sherlock* series or the excitement of premieres of other mystery TV series like *Castle*.

As a producer myself I tend to analyze my reaction to movies and television shows and ask what was lacking and who was at fault. I think Jonny Lee Miller plays Sherlock Holmes well enough given the material he had to work with. I think Lucy Liu has potential as Watson but came across as a little stiff - as if she had not had enough time to get comfortable in her role. Some of the other performances also seemed stiff, all of which suggests that they were provided their scripts pretty late and had little chance to rehearse. (Not unusual for TV.) I think most of the items that detract from the performances of these impersonators of Holmes and Watson can be laid at the door of the writers directors of the episode and/or producer/show-runner. These include the tattoos, the prostitute, the underwear band showing and the stiffness of the performances. The good news is that the writers and directors are usually different on different episodes of network television series. So maybe will we see some better episodes.

I think some of the criticisms put forth by others are based on different interpretations of the dialogue.

I think the producers of *Elementary* should try another cinematographer. Most of the shots of New York in the premiere are fairly bland except for the lovely shots of the cityscape from the roof where Holmes keeps his bee hives. TV shows such as *Castle* and *CSI:NY* demonstrate how you can get some great footage in the City when you have the right person behind the camera.

Despite the fact that the series did not have a remarkable premiere, I think *Elementary* has potential. We will see if it lives up to that potential.


